1 Timothy 6:18, Ephesians 2:1-7, Luke 7:36-50, Titus 3:4-7

Reflect

Take some time and reflect before you begin: Would you consider yourself rich in good deeds? What do you think that looks like? We learned that being rich in good deeds means being rich in kindness and mercy. What do those things look like practically? What keeps us from being rich in those areas?

Pastor Adam Martin taught us three results of being rich in good deeds:

1. Being rich in good deeds will bring us joy
 - a. When was the last time you were generous with good deeds in a way that brought you joy? When was the last time you received someone else's generosity?
 - b. If this is true, that being rich in good deeds makes us joyful, why aren't we generous in this way more often?
2. Being rich in good deeds will help others to see God
 - a. What does being rich in good deeds teach others about God? What can they learn about him from our generosity?
 - b. What have you learned about God from being generous? Has it helped you see him in a different way?
3. Being rich in good deeds will lead us towards generosity
 - a. Being generous with money isn't easy, especially if money is tight. The thought of giving money away might be stressful! But we can always be generous with kindness and mercy. How might being rich in good deeds help us become more generous in other ways?
